When you are first diagnosed with kidney failure, the thought of what lies ahead can be very daunting. There are so many options:

- I would like to change to haemodialysis at home, but I do not have storage space for the supplies I will need.

It is often better to discuss these concerns with fellow kidney patients who can tell you of their own personal experiences. It is possible to do this at the Kidney Patient Support Group. They meet regularly at the Sussex Kidney Unit in Brighton on the 1<sup>st</sup> Friday of every month. If you don't want to travel to Brighton, you can join the meetings online via Zoom.

One of the questions asked here might be answered by the details to follow – probably for 2025 now considering we are in August that is not too far away


